

In 1942, Aya's family had their home on Quadra Island, their boats and family heirlooms confiscated and the family eventually sent to an internment camp in Kaslo. At 20 she was recruited to teach secondary school in the camp and continued in that profession for more than 35 years.

Part of a coalition that advocated for human-rights issues in regard to Japanese-Canadian repatriation, she received the Queen Elizabeth Silver Jubilee Medal in 1977. She was a 30-year volunteer for the local hospital auxiliary and has dedicated herself to promoting racial equality and sponsoring children in Third World
